## **CHEFA Support Science Education with \$30K Grant** Funds will support Connecticut Science Center STEM Education Materials and Programs

**Hartford, CT**— October 23, 2015— The Connecticut Science Center was awarded a \$30,000 grant from the Connecticut Health and Educational Facilities Authority (CHEFA) as part of its Not-for-Profit Grant Program.

Located in downtown Hartford, the Connecticut Science Center is a non-profit organization dedicated to enhancing science education throughout the state of Connecticut and New England, providing learning opportunities for students and adults of all ages, and engaging the community in scientific exploration. The Science Center provides educational programs throughout the year to student and teachers and features 165 exhibits in ten galleries and a range of topics, including space and earth sciences, physical sciences, biology, the Connecticut River watershed, alternative energy sources, Connecticut inventors and innovations, a children's gallery, and much more. Other features include four educational labs, a 200-seat 3D digital theater.

The Connecticut Science Center will use the funds for educational equipment and materials in classroom laboratories and public programming spaces. Specifically, these improvements will allow the

Science Center to integrate stronger connections to technology and engineering into existing programs, develop new curriculum-focused live programs, address Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS), and better serve more than 325,000 visitors annually, which include students and teachers from every town in the state of Connecticut.

"The impacts that these critical programs have on the community, specifically students and teachers, help us continue to inspire the next generation of creative thinkers and make strong curriculum ties in the classroom." The Connecticut Health and Educational Facilities Authority (CHEFA) recently announced \$1.3 million in grants to 24 nonprofit agencies throughout the state. CHEFA is a quasi-public agency created by the State Legislature to help Connecticut healthcare and educational institutions, and other not-for-profit entities obtain tax exempt financing.
